BRIEFING

Overview

RTCS Members and Alternates met virtually by teleconference. At this regular meeting, the Subcommittee received presentations regarding the upcoming Paratransit/Non-Emergency Medical Transportation Provider Summit and three ongoing or recently-completed suburban transit studies: The Woodlands Township Transit Study, the Fort Bend Transit Vision Plan, and the Pearland Transit Needs Assessment.

INTRODUCTIONS AND CERTIFICATION OF QUORUM

ITEM 1 – Ruthanne Haut, Chair, The Woodlands Township, convened the meeting at 9:32 AM. Roll was called by H-GAC staff and a quorum was certified.

PUBLIC COMMENT

ITEM 2 – There were no public comments presented to the Subcommittee.

ACTION ITEMS

ITEM 3.1 – Approval of RTC Subcommittee Meeting Minutes of February 1, 2024

Ms. Haut requested a motion to approve the minutes of the February 1, 2024 Special Call meeting of the Subcommittee.

Philip Salerno indicated that he did not receive the meeting packet. Other Subcommittee members indicated likewise. H-GAC staff apologized and promised to re-send the meeting packet to entire Subcommittee following the meeting.

Action Item Motion: moved by Perri D'Armond, seconded by Melanie Beaman. Action Item approved.

INFORMATION ITEMS

ITEM 4.1a - Provider Summit Update - Sandy Klanfer, H-GAC

Sandy Klanfer provided the Subcommittee with an update on the upcoming Paratransit/Non-Emergency Medical Transportation Provider Summit. The purpose of the Summit is to bring regional Paratransit and NEMT providers together for discussion, coordination and training. The Summit will include both small group discussions and a panel discussion and will be held at H-GAC's office on June 25, 2024 from 11 am to 2 pm.

There were no questions or comments for Mr. Klanfer.

ITEM 4.2a - The Woodlands Township Transit Study - Ruthanne Haut, The Woodlands Township

Ruthanne Haut presented the results of The Woodlands Township Transit Study. The study was funded by a federal route planning grant and its purpose was to consider what transit services provided by The Woodlands would look like after the COVID-19 pandemic. Ms. Haut discussed potential operational improvements and service expansions for both the Town Center Trolley and The Woodlands Express commuter system. Some of these improvements have already been implemented, and others are under consideration for near-term implementation.

Chris Whaley asked if Woodlands Express buses operating between Greenway Plaza and downtown Houston could be ridden as a local trip for a reduced fare. Ms. Haut said that the Township's preference is to keep the fare structure as simple as possible but if there's capacity on the buses to handle such trips the suggestion might be worth consideration. Sandy Klanfer said that he was excited about the proposed improvements, including the operator retention strategies and the stop annunciators for the trolleys. Thomas Gray noted that the study was very comprehensive and "left no stone unturned."

ITEM 4.2b - Fort Bend Transit Vision Plan - Perri D'Armond, Fort Bend Transit

Perri D'Armond presented the results of the Fort Bend Transit Vision Plan. The plan's goals were to promote safety, implement sustainable outcomes, improve accessibility and enhance transit education. The plan's recommendations were broken into three phases: realign, renew and reimagine. Each phase contained components related to service planning, capital projects and technological investments.

Ruthanne Haut congratulated Ms. D'Armond on her study and noted that Fort Bend County and The Woodlands are both facing similar challenges to their transit services due to continued growth. She suggested regular discussions between the two providers. Ms. D'Armond agreed and added that technology is Fort Bend Transit's biggest challenge. In that regard, she said she appreciated H-GAC's work in implementing a regional fare system.

ITEM 4.2c - Pearland Transit Need Assessment Update - Alan Rodenstein, H-GAC

Alan Rodenstein provided the Subcommittee with an update on the Pearland Transit Need Assessment. He discussed the study tasks that have been completed, the transit alternatives currently being considered for recommendations, the costs and benefits associated with those alternatives, and next steps.

Ruthanne Haut noted that the entire region is growing and that it was good to see so many communities looking at how transit can grow as well. Thomas Gray agreed, noting that the three transit studies just presented to the Subcommittee represented three different ways to tailor transit to suburban communities, given limited funding and development patterns not suited to typical fixed-route bus. Mr. Gray said that this Subcommittee is important because it gives providers a chance to share experiences and best practices in a region that still has significant transit need. Ms. Haut noted that the demand for park and ride service was especially significant and that the more information regional providers can share, the better.

AGENCY REPORTS

Item 5 – Transit and Human Service Agency Reports

Vernon Chambers announced that the National Aging and Disability Transportation Center recognized Harris County Rides in their 2023 Innovations Showcase. Harris County Rides was one of 14 providers selected.

Thomas Gray announced that the National Center for Mobility Management is working on the Community Transportation Map, which was originally a record of FTA-funded transportation agencies across the nation but which now features mobility management and volunteer organizations. Mr. Gray provided the NCMM's website and encouraged providers, including human service and non-profit agencies, to access the map and submit their information.

Mr. Gray also announced that the regional transit ridership survey for the first quarter of 2024 will be sent out to agencies sometime next week.

Ruthanne Haut announced that the Texas Transit Association would be hosting a variety of trainings in San Antonio and encouraged providers to attend.

ADJOURNMENT

Ms. Haut adjourned the meeting at 11:02 AM.

Election of Subcommittee Officers

Section E of the Bylaws and Operating Procedures of the Transportation Advisory Committee's Subcommittees (amended 5/13/2020) reads:

Each subcommittee shall elect a Chair and Vice-Chair, each to serve for a term of one year and no more than 2 consecutive years in any single position. Elections shall be held at the first meeting of each calendar year after the appointment of the subcommittee. Preferably, the Chair and Vice-Chair will be members of the TAC. The current Chair shall bring before the subcommittee a slate of officers for consideration. In the event the Chair is unable to serve the entire term of office, the Vice Chair shall succeed to the office of Chair and the new Chair shall appoint a subcommittee member to serve as Vice Chair for the remainder of the term. This appointment shall be subject to approval by the majority of the subcommittee members present at the next called meeting.

This is the first meeting of the Regional Transit Coordination Subcommittee following its appointment by the TAC. The incumbent Chair and Vice-Chair have both served one out of the maximum of two years in their roles as Officers.

Per the Bylaws, the incumbent Chair has brought before Subcommittee the following slate of officers for consideration:

Chair: De'Andre Guin, City of Conroe Vice-Chair: James Oliver, City of Galveston

The Subcommittee may vote on this slate or make nominations for other members to serve as Officers. In order to be elected, Officer candidates require the approval of the majority of the Subcommittee members present at the meeting.

BYLAWS AND OPERATING PROCEDURES OF THE TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE'S SUBCOMMITTEES

(Amended, 05/13/20)

The following rules shall govern the procedures and composition of the Subcommittees of the Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC):

A. Purpose

The purpose of the subcommittees of the TAC is to advise the TAC in its development of the Unified Planning Work Program and the Metropolitan Transportation Plan as well as promote coordination of other transportation planning activities. The subcommittees assist with the development of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), including the review of and recommendations on candidate projects for the TIP. In addition, subcommittees also review various current and future transportation policies, programs, and projects specific to the topics and goals of each subcommittee.

B. Voting Membership

Each subcommittee shall be comprised of members of the TAC, their representatives or persons nominated to serve who have expertise or interest in transportation planning and related issues.

Membership should reflect the diversity of transportation modes and interests affected by transportation policy decisions to assure transportation planning decisions are considered in their broadest context. Meetings of TAC subcommittees shall be open to public attendance. The voting membership for each subcommittee are defined in the subcommittee descriptions.

Members shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing agency for a term of one (1) year. Membership shall be appointed or confirmed by majority vote of the TAC in attendance at a regularly scheduled meeting with a quorum of TAC members. Engineering, planning, or other consultants, who are for-profit or have financial interest in transportation projects are not eligible to serve as a member due to potential conflict of interest.

C. Alternate Members

Each voting member may have a designated alternate member who may serve at any subcommittee meeting in the voting member's absence. Alternate members must be appointed in the same manner as the voting member. Appointed alternate members will have the voting rights and privileges of members when serving in the absence of the subcommittee voting member.

D. Ex-Officio Members

The Transportation Advisory Committee Chair may appoint such other nonvoting ex-officio representatives as may be appropriate, subject to approval of a majority of the voting

membership. Ex-officio members may include Railroads, Rail Districts, Ports, Transit Agencies, or other agencies as appropriate that are not already included in the voting members.

E. Officers

Each subcommittee shall elect a Chair and Vice-Chair, each to serve for a term of one year and no more than 2 consecutive years in any single position. Elections shall be held at the first meeting of each calendar year after the appointment of the subcommittee. Preferably, the Chair and Vice-Chair will be members of the TAC. The current Chair shall bring before the subcommittee a slate of officers for consideration. In the event the Chair is unable to serve the entire term of office, the Vice Chair shall succeed to the office of Chair and the new Chair shall appoint a subcommittee member to serve as Vice Chair for the remainder of the term. This appointment shall be subject to approval by the majority of the subcommittee members present at the next called meeting.

F. Vacancies

Each member shall be eligible to serve during the term as long as the member occupies the position held at the time of his or her appointment to the subcommittee. In the event that a voting member becomes ineligible or unable to serve, a new member must be appointed in the same manner as the previous voting member.

G. Quorum

Fifty percent of the total committee voting membership shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings.

H. Meetings

Robert's Rules of Order shall govern all meetings. Each subcommittee shall meet at least quarterly or more frequently as need arises. Notice of each meeting shall be provided to each member at least one week prior to the meeting. Opportunities for public comments shall be provided subject to the guidelines of the Transportation Advisory Committee.

I. Minutes

Minutes of all meetings shall be kept and recorded by H-GAC staff furnished to the Subcommittee for this purpose.

J. Administrative Support

H-GAC as the designated MPO, shall provide administrative support to the TAC subcommittees.

(Amended, 05/13/20)

TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS MANAGEMENT AND OPERATIONS (TSMO) SUBCOMMITTEE

Purpose

The Transportation Systems Management and Operations Subcommittee will provide guidance on the development of Regional ITS architecture and a Regional Automated and Connected Vehicle Strategy.

Meeting Schedule

Meetings will be held quarterly.

Membership

The OTF Subcommittee membership are nominated and appointed by the TAC and are representatives of the various stakeholders involved with Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS). This shall include technically qualified professionals; local, county and state agency engineers and planners; as well as members of the TAC knowledgeable in ITS standards. A maximum of seventeen (17) voting members shall comprise the Subcommittee.

- Houston-Galveston Metropolitan Planning Area is one of most diverse in U.S.
- Of 7.1 million residents, more than 1.2 million are identified as Limited in English Proficiency (LEP), defined as:
 - Primary ("home") language is not English, and
 - · Limited ability to read, write, speak, or understand communication in English
- Drawbacks of language barriers
 - Restricts access to public services and benefits, vital information
 - Barrier to meaningful participation in H-GAC programs and activities
- Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, E.O. 13166




Language Access Plan (LAP) - Process



- LAP contains policies and procedures to facilitate meaningful access for stakeholders with LEP
- Four-Factor Analysis:
 - Number of LEP persons
 - Frequency of contact
 - Importance to people's lives
 - Available resources, service costs
- Safe-Harbor Test: 5% or 1,000 native speakers
- Community Roundtable Events
- Language and Engagement Survey

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Transit Ridership Survey Update



Through first six months of 2024

- Regional fixed-route ridership:
 - 11% higher than 2023
 - Still only 86.6% of 2019's ridership
 - o In February, METRO achieved 99.9% of 2019 local bus ridership
 - o METRO P&R ridership is only 46% of what it was in 2019
- Regional ADA/DR ridership:
 - 19% higher than 2023
 - 99.8% of 2019 ridership
 - o Ridership likely reflects recently-implemented microtransit operations
