H-GAC's Commute Solutions Program Launches its Biketober Challenge

Ride, learn about bike safety, and win prizes throughout the month!

The Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) and its Commute Solutions program invite bike riders throughout the eight-county region, which includes Brazoria, Chambers, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Montgomery, and Waller counties, to participate in the free Bike the Gulf Biketober Challenge from October 1-31, 2023.

"With October bringing cooler temperatures to the area, this is a great opportunity for residents to hop on a bike and enjoy the host of benefits riding a bike has to offer," said Emanuel Andrews, H-GAC senior program coordinator. "Biking can help to reduce stress and anxiety, improve heart health, and strengthen the immune system."

H-GAC, Commute Solutions, and Love to Ride, a program that inspires individuals and communities to start riding more, have partnered again to champion biking in the region. Riders of every level have the opportunity to log their rides taken during October on the Love to Ride Bike the Gulf website to be entered to win prizes.

Individuals, community groups, and workplaces can register to join the Biketober Challenge. Each ride an individual logs can help them earn points toward prize drawings for a \$4,000 vacation and other great prizes.

Points accrued by individuals help workplaces climb the Biketober Challenge leaderboards. Workplaces compete against other organizations of a similar size in this friendly competition that aims to help get more people cycling in the eight-county region.

Reminder: Solid Waste Application Deadline Approaching!



H-GAC'S SOLID WASTE GRANT Application Deadline: Noon, Tuesday, Oct. 17

H-GAC receives a portion of the money collected as tipping fees at landfills across the state as pass-through funding from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to fund solid waste grant projects throughout the 13-county region.

As part of this program, H-GAC will award \$1 million in solid waste program grant funds to eligible projects through a competitive process.

Grants will begin in March or September 2024, and all work must be completed by June 2025. This is the only call for projects planned for this biennium.

The grant application period will close at noon Tuesday, October 17.

Reducing Flood Risk While Enhancing Water Quality

As home to more than 16,000 miles of waterways and shoreline, most residents in the Houston-Galveston region live within a mile or two of a waterway. Rivers, lakes, bays, and bayous enhance local economies, make up a crucial part of water supplies, and provide habitat for wildlife. Protecting and preserving the quality of these water bodies is essential to the region's quality of life.

By 2035, much of the region's drinking water will come from water in rivers, lakes, and bayous. Pollutants in these waters can increase the cost of treating water to be suitable for drinking. Today, most water bodies in the region do not meet the state standard for contact recreation.

One of the ways water quality in the region can be improved is through preserving, restoring, or enhancing natural areas through conservation practices. Conserving land adjacent to waterways and in upland natural areas like wetlands, forests, and prairies helps reduce the amount of pollution running off the land and into water bodies via stormwater.

An example of this is the Jersey Meadows Stormwater Detention Basin.

THE JERSEY MEADOWS STORMWATER DETENTION BASIN

A partnership project between the Harris County Flood Control District, Harris County Precinct 4, and the city of Jersey Village resulted in the purchase of the Jersey Meadows Golf Course in 2008.

The conversion of this old golf course into the 43-acre, 114 million-gallon capacity Jersey Meadows Stormwater Detention Basin not only removed 4,000 structures from the 100-year floodplain but also led to significant water quality benefits.

The basin project included wetlands to filter water pollutants, native trees and shrubs, and a walking trail for residents.

Incorporating natural plantings and riparian vegetation has helped reduce bacteria concentrations in White Oak Bayou in addition to the neighboring community's flood damage reduction.

Enhancing urban areas with natural functions like wet-bottom detention ponds, trees, and native landscaping in new developments also helps reduce runoff pollution from roads and parking lots.

In 2021, the Houston-Galveston Area Council launched the Regional Conservation Initiative aimed at magnifying local conservation efforts and assisting local governments and nonprofits in securing the funding and resources needed to launch their own conservation projects.
