Deaf Gain

A PROVACATION

Reviewing how the concept of 'Deaf Gain' demonstrates the positive implications of deafness and claims deafness as a gain rather than a loss of hearing. The importance of viewing deafness not as a disability but as a benefit and vital aspect of humanity's diversity.



Deaf Space

The DeafSpace approach focuses on creating spaces that express connections, instead of barriers. There is an overlooked beauty in this process, offering an intimate perspective into the nature of language, community, and 'ways of being' for shaping places – an architecture that resonates with humanity's oldest dwellings i.e. the caverns.



Deaf Space

Liminal spaces such as the porch or veranda were common architectural concepts in many buildings designed for deaf institutions. Not only they provide shade and fresh air in the sun as well as shelter from the rain, they offered high visibility between the inside and outside spaces for their occupants. A space between publicity and intimacy, sight and oversight as well as inside

and outside.






Deaf Space LANGUAGE VIBRANCY

Gallaudet University is a real site of cultural resistance – built in 1850 during an era where America was flirting with the idea of eugenics and sterilization for deaf and disabled people. Their concept of Deaf Gain offers a radical reframing that views being deaf not as a 'loss' but an advantage – a different and remarkable way of being.













Ways of Being

STARTING FROM DIFFERENCE

Starting from difference to expose and challenge underlying attitudes, assumptions and practices that frame disabled people in particular and limited ways to open up new alternative kinds of inventive interventions that foster inclusion, human vitality (flourishing) and language vibrancy.

Festivals influence people's idea of a city.


They provide many points of identification and contribute to the birth of non-mainstream urban identities.


They consolidate subcultures and create togetherness among amateurs of a common field.
