

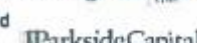

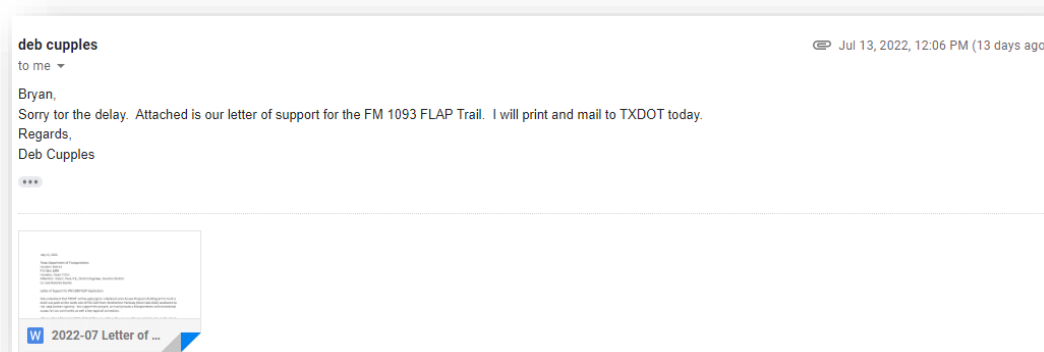

I write regarding the Federal Lands Access Program application the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) submitted to the Federal Highway Administration for the construction of a multi-use path on FM 1093. This project will provide important new pedestrian and bike access to recreation along local and statewide trails, improve safety, and facilitate access to local businesses and services.

This multi-use path, located on the north side of FM 1093 from Westheimer Parkway to FM 1464, will create multi-modal transportation opportunities while improving safety and promoting accessibility for all users. Currently, there are no sidewalks connecting to existing ADA ramps and no designated bike facilities on the corridor. It will incorporate high-visibility crosswalks, pedestrian refuge in the medians, and intersection improvements. These improvements will provide safe non-vehicle routes to local businesses, including a nearby grocery store.

This path is also located adjacent to George Bush Park, a 7,800-acre park with sports fields, a shooting range, pavilions, playgrounds, ponds, and jogging trails. This project will also convert unused federal land surrounding the Park into recreational and transportation hike and bike paths, providing non-motorized access for nearby residents and connecting the Park to 30 miles of existing trail throughout Houston.

In the future, this path will also enable connection of the more than 40-mile Terry Hershey/George Bush/Cullen Park/Mason Creek/Willow Fork Drainage District trail system to the Brays Bayou trail system. This connection will total approximately 70 miles of high comfort trails and provide safe access to the roughly 27,000 acres of greenspace in Barker and Addicks reservoirs.
